

## PAGE 5 — VERBS

- sank** — The sentence should be 'When the hurricane was over, the boat sank to the sea floor.' This is the correct past tense form of the verb 'to sink' and agrees with the subject — 'boat'.
- was** — The sentence should be 'I was suffering last week, but I have improved since then.' This is the correct past tense form of the verb 'to be' and agrees with the subject — 'I'.
- Write** — The sentence should be 'Write clearly so people can comprehend what you mean.' This is an instruction so 'Write' is the only option that fits the sentence.
- rang** — The sentence should be 'Leo reached the door, timidly raised his hand and rang the bell.' This is the correct past tense form of the verb 'to ring' and agrees with the subject — 'Leo'.
- continue** — The sentence should be 'We continue to be terribly anxious about yesterday's events.' This is the correct present tense form of the verb 'to continue' and agrees with the subject — 'We'.
- had** — The sentence should be 'I had just finished my dinner when I heard the shrill scream.' This is the correct option to complete the verb phrase 'had just finished' — the first part of the sentence is describing something that happened in the past, so you need 'had', not 'have'.
- will** — The sentence should be 'You will hear the result of the competition next week.' This sentence is in the future tense so 'will' is correct.
- forgotten** — The sentence should be 'The gerbil had forgotten where its tail was.' This is the correct option to complete the verb phrase 'had forgotten'.
- will** — The sentence should be 'This morning I will be going to work in a spaceship.' This sentence is in the future tense so 'will' is correct.
- spoke (or was speaking)** — The sentence should be 'I spoke in class, so the teacher shouted at me.' This is the correct past tense form of the verb 'to speak'.
- lent** — The sentence should be 'Pedro had never lent me his favourite CD.' This is the correct option to complete the verb phrase 'had never lent'.
- visiting (or going to visit)** — The sentence should be 'Who were you visiting yesterday?' This is the correct option to complete the phrase 'were you visiting'.
- comes (or will come)** — The sentence should be 'Egbert says he will go to the zoo if Edwina comes too.' This is the correct form of the verb 'to come'.
- did (or was doing or was going to do)** — The sentence should be 'Last month I did an hour of exercise every day.' This is the correct past tense form of the verb 'to do'.
- noticed** — The sentence should be 'We were merrily on our way to Wales when we noticed the deflated tyre.' This is the correct past tense form of the verb 'to notice'.
- swam (or was swimming)** — The sentence should be 'When the boat capsized, the sailor swam back to shore.'
- threw (or was throwing)** — The sentence should be 'Mr Thomas threw his socks in the washing machine yesterday.' This is the correct past tense form of the verb 'to throw'.
- brought (or had brought)** — The sentence should be 'He brought crisps and lemonade to last summer's picnic.' This is the correct past tense form of the verb 'to bring'.
